Also, your mention of Otto Hahn reminds me of another story. In 1966 when he must have been 87 or 88 years old, he came to Vienna to receive the Fermi Prize, and I had the responsibility and pleasure as Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission to bestow this upon him in a huge ceremony. After the ceremony and later in the evening, when most of us were getting kind of tired and wanted to retire, he wanted to go out to the bar. And then, believe me, he did have an eye for the girls. And I think we finally had to say, you know, Professor Hahn, don't you think maybe it is getting a little late for a man of your age. I guess he finally humored us and called it quits.

I should mention that Greg Choppin traveled the farthest of anybody in coming to this meeting. He is at Karlsruhe on a sabbatical leave this year at the Institute for Transuranium Research, so we appreciate very much his taking the trouble to come this distance.
