
1. Subject clinical investigation proposal from your medical facility has been given our file number 339. Future correspondence regarding this study should refer to its title and file number.

2. The Surgeon General's Clinical Investigation Committee did not favorably consider this proposal. We suggest that the study address the following points and be resubmitted.

a. It appears that the subjects (those referred to Wilford Hall USAF Medical Center for radiotherapy) and the controls (those operated in Wilford Hall USAF Medical Center) will represent two separate and distinct categories and thus bias the results. We feel that the patients referred to Wilford Hall USAF Medical Center will be those who have a lower probability of successful surgery for breast carcinoma.

b. An equivalent number of patients and controls should be used. Consideration should be given to the assignment of patients to the radiated or nonradiated groups to preclude biasing the results.
