

At the close of the last historical report (period ending 30 June 1952), two major problems were indicated as outstanding at that time. These problems are noted briefly as follows:

a. Establishment of Special equipment requirements for our WB-29 aircraft in order to meet the needs of the AFOAT program.

b. Interjection of the DIR program for assigned WB-29s during the period preceding and during the project.

In addition to the problems noted above, a third major problem arose with respect to the movement of personnel to and from Kwajalein. The assignment of IC-97s to the 57th in sufficient time to permit their use to support the project, became a very dim possibility, necessitating a change in mode of transportation.

Each of the above problems has been solved in a more or less satisfactory manner during the period of this installment and is discussed in detail in the text which follows. This historical narrative is recorded chronologically by relative date of occurence. The solutions to the cited problems are therefore interspersed with information of a general nature.

Shortly after the first of July 1952, the Commander, Pacific Division, MATS, Hickam AFB, TH, received wire notification from Hq, MATS, Andrews Air Force Base, Maryland, that the former Headquarters was to conduct an Operational Readiness Inspection (ORI) of the Weather Reconnaissance Element, Provisional (132.4.3.1). After an exchange of wires between MATS and PACD to clarify certain details of the inspection, an inspection period of 5, 6, and 7 August was established for the ORI. The ORI was to be conducted concurrently with a major inspection of the 57th Strat Recon Sq. M, Wea., by the 2143rd Air



Weather Wing from the 4th thru the 8th of August 1952.

On the 15th of July the movement order for the Weather Reconnaissance Element was received from Headquarters, Air Weather Service. Because of certain discrepancies in the order, appropriate changes were requested by radio message. Changes were approved in a return wire from Headquarters, Air Weather Service. Inclosure #1 contains a copy of the movement order, and the changes.


On the 17th of July a letter was dispatched to the Commanding Officer, 2143rd Air Weather Wing, apprising him of the current status of planning for the Weather Reconnaissance Element. In this letter, it was noted that the tentative assignment of the YC-97 aircraft to the 57th Squadron required affirmation inasmuch as all planning for movement of the Weather Recon Element had been based on the availability of such support aircraft. Authority was requested to accept one NC-97 on 1 August 1952 even though the aircraft did not have TO-O1-20-EJ-209 and Boeing MCR #39 modification kits (fire detection systems) installed. (The lack of the noted modification is the basis upon which Air Weather Service had declined to accept the IC-97 aircraft from the MATS unit to which same are now assigned.) Our proposal was rejected and this unit was advised to refer transportation requirements to Headquarters, Air Weather Service. After an exchange of wires between Headquarters Air Weather Service, Task Group 132.4, and this unit, the matter eventually resolved itself into the utilization of water transportation for one officer and 101 airmen. The use of water transportation (MSTS Transport "General Aultman") has necessitated major revisions to shipping schedules and adjustment of associated support requirements. Tentatively the General Aultman will depart Pearl Harbor

on 22 September, and arrive at Kwajalein on 29 September. Local arrangements with Pacific Division, MATS at Hickam has provided for MATS airlift of fifty persons to Kwajalein between the 10th and 19th of September. The remainder of personnel will be conveyed by unit WB-29 aircraft. / Headquarters, Air Weather Service was further requested to obligate sufficient airlift to move two built-up B-3350-AM engines per week from Hickam to Kwajalein over a period of seven weeks beginning 12 October 1952. Also submitted were tentative airlift requirements for the return of personnel from the project site at the delle completion of IVI (Restricted) operations. e, A . 3rd Air Weather Wing. In the dated 17 July 1952 Trequest ~ Reconne requestation submitted for the deletion of DIR schedules to WRAMA for the months of October and November 1952. This request was based on the fact that see maintenance and flying commitments during the project were such, that the transfer of aircraft to and from the depot during the project iic 1 would jeopardize our capabilities with respect to assigned tasks. Subsequent correspondence received from 2143rd Air Weather Wing, indicated that our depot schedule of commitments for October and November had been deleted. - The problem of establishing the exact requirements for the special equip ment required to support the AFOAT-1 mission was the subject of a considerable amount of attention during the months of July and August. However, with the proper personnel advised of our need for information the problem was completely resolved by the 15th of August 1952. Type and quantities of equipment, requirements for installation and maintenance of same, frequency and times of special missions at Kwajalein, supplies of necessary expendables and provision of special equipment operators for certain equipment. These matters have all been



discussed and resolved, so that no particular problems exist in this category.. On the L4th of July 1952, a conference was held at Hickam Air Force Base with the Task Group 132.4 Radiological Safety Officer, his assistant, and radiological safety officers of the Test Support Unit who will provide technical assistance to the Weather Reconnaissance Element at the forward area. Matters of training, aircraft decontamination requirements, radiological safety equipment, cloud tracking and sampling, and air radex plotting were discussed and problems related thereto were resolved to the satisfaction of all concerned. No major problems are considered to exist in the matter of Radiological Safety, inasmuch as each of the weather officers obligated to the Weather Reconnaissance Element has completed the Keesler AFB Radiological Officer Course, and has previously participated in the radsafe operations of GREENHOUSE.

During the period 5 thru 7 August 1952, the Inspector General, Pacific Division, MATS, conducted the required Operational Readiness Inspection of the Weather Reconnaissance Element. A copy of the Inspection Report is attached as Inclosure #2. The inspection findings were such as to indicate that the Weather Reconnaissance Element is capable of performing the required mission at Kwajalein.

The training program for weather reconnaissance element personnel was initiated during the latter part of July 1952. By the 25th of August, all but 22 persons had completed all required training. The remaining persons will be scheduled for necessary make-up classes during the first week in September.

Security clearances of all personnel were again closely checked during the latter part of August and no discrepancies were found to exist.

On the 5th of August, a representative of the 57th proceeded to Kwajalein for the purpose of reviewing status of supplies and facilities for the Weather-

Reconnaissance Element. A physical check of stock records revealed that approximately 85% of items requisitioned, were "in-stock". An undetermined amount of equipment was on hand and was due to be processed into stock and recorded at a future date. Of the 278 line items which were to be shipped from Eniwetok to Kwajalein, for the Weather Reconnaissance Element, only one item was on hand at Kwajalein. Information was received at the time however, that the remaining 277 items would be shipped from Eniwetok during the second week of August. Review of facilities to be utilized by the Weather Reconnaissance Element indicated that same were adequate. A second supply survey team is scheduled to depart Hickam for Kwajalein for three days TDI to complete a final supply survey.

The administrative aspects of the preparatory period became active during the month of July. Schedules were arranged with the Base Surgeon, and Base Dental Surgeon for completion in September and August of these annual physicals which would normally fall due in October and November, radiological physicals for aircrew members, dental checks of all personnel who have not had checks in the past six months, bringing of shots up to dates, and communicable disease examinations 48 hours prior to departure for Kwajalein. In order to eliminate as much administration at the forward area, arrangements have been made for the retention of pay records at Hickam. Weather Reconnaissance Element personnel will be paid by a Class A agent finance officer from the 57th who will carry necessary checks and funds to Kwajalein each payday. Forms 5 (Flight Records) will be retained by the parent unit at Hickam, and work sheets will be forwarded from Kwajalein, to the 57th SRS at Hickam.

Considerable information was received during the months of July and August relative to Cost Accounting procedures for the Weather Reconnaissance Element while at Kwajalein. This item appears to be on which will cause considerable difficulty for the Reconnaissance Element inasmuch as the manning of the unit does not include the extensive manpower which will be required to ferret out the necessary cost data. Maintenance of extensive cost accounting systems such as are prescribed for an the Weather Reconnaissance Element (which is supposed to be an operational unit) requires well-trained cost accounting to deta. Neither of these is available. A certain amount of information relative to pay and allowances of project personnel can be extracted from cost records maintained by the 1500th Air Base Wing at Hickam and negotiation for such information indicates that it will be made available. Further effort will be extended to reduce the workload involved in preparing prescribed cost accounting reports.

A request for detailed information on the requirements for Weather Reconnaissance tracks out of Kwajalein was submitted to the Joint Task Force 132 Staff Weather Officer in March 1952. Since to information has been received polotime to our request, first PETREL weather reconnaissance tracks were the Weather Formation sheets for each of the eight PETREL tracks drawn up by the since of the eight PETREL tracks are included as Inclosure #3.

I. AUTHORITY AND ACTIVITY INSPECTED

1. Pursuant to the provisions of AFR 123-1, 28 March 1952, and Hq MATS message, MAGIG 1953, dated 10 July 1952, an Operational Readiness Inspection was conducted of Weather Reconnaissance Element, Provisional (132.4,3.1) organized from personnel, aircraft, equipment and supplies of the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron, Medium, Weather, Hickam Air Force Base, APC 953. This inspection was conducted by Colonel Ulysses G. Jones, Inspector General, Pacific Division, Military Air Transport Service, APC 953, during the period 4 through 8 August 1952.

2. At the time of this inspection, the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron was commanded by Lt Colonel Fred C. Simpson, USAF, who has exercised command since 18 August 1951. Prior to this date and since 16 June 1951, command was vested in Colonel Arthur A. McCartan.

II. SPHERE OF INQUIRY AND OBSERVATION

3. Mission.

a. The mission of Weather Reconnaissance Element, Provisional (132.4.3.1), as set forth in Operations Plan, Serial No. 1-52, Headquarters Task Group 132.4, is to provide, operate and support the necessary aircraft to collect cloud samples at intervals after each detonation; to provide weather reconnaissance, analysis and forecasting, and to collect samples as required by the AFOAT-1 program.

b. MATS TD PN-1, Air Weather Service, 1 March 1952, Weather Reconnaissance Element, Provisional (132.4.3.1) provides for 10 WB-29 aircraft and 309 officers and airmen.


c. Specific mission, as established in Operations Flan, Serial No. 1-52, Hq Task Group 132.4, is as follows:

"WB-29 aircraft of the Weather Reconnaissance Element will perform two weather missions each day, of approximately 12 hours duration, commencing on M-20 days; and three weather missions each day, of approximately 12 hours duration, commencing on M-4 days. Beginning on 10 October 1952, this Element will assume Typhoon reconnaissance responsibility within a specified area. The Joint Task Force Weather Central will coordinate this effort. This Element will conduct post-shot missions in connection with radiological safety, consisting of two missions each day, of approximately 12 hours duration, from shot day until shot plus two days; and will collect samples for the AFOAT-1 program in conjunction with cloud tracking functions."

III. SUMMARY

5. Personnel and Administration.

a. With the exception of the qualifications of personnel (paragraph 6, Annex A) the discrepancies and deficiencies reported in the Personnel and Administration Annex should not adversely affect the mission of the Weather Reconnaissance Element, Provisional (132.4.3.1). Those items which have been reported are either locally correctible or not of a serious nature, with the possible exception of paragraph 6.

b. The inspection of records and personnel was confined to those projected for movement with the Weather Element as indicated by the list of "Current Personnel and Shipping Assignments as of 24 July 1952," of which a copy is attached as Inclosure No. 1 to Annex A.


6. Tactical Operations and Training. Inspection of aircrew tactical capabilities in special radiological and weather reconnaissance missions was found to be satisfactory. The high degree and quantity of technical training, plus previous experience under actual conditions similar to those which they will be called on to perform for Task Group 132.4 gives the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Element the operational and tactical ability to successfully carry out their assigned mission.


7. <u>Supply</u>. Completeness of organizational equipment and supplies and satisfactory maintenance of supply records indicate that squadron supply personnel are well qualified and familiar with the needs of the organization. The fact that a very small amount of organization equipment is to accompany the Reconnaissance Element, Provisional (132.4.3.1) will make them dependent for logistical support upon the Task Force and the success of the supply activity will be dependent upon the logistical support provided. Reference is made to paragraph 6, Annex C.

8. <u>Maintenance</u>. Maintenance of aircraft and allied equipment is performed in a manner which indicates the ability of the organization to fulfill the requirements of a mission based on the utilization for which the Squadron is organized.



1. Administration

-- -

a. Administrative practices and procedures of the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron are efficient and orderly. The Squadron is currently publishing information sheets and individual check lists for distribution to individuals comprising the Weather Reconnaissance Element, Provisional (132.4.3.1). These publications are intended to provide information on established procedures and facilitate processing and movement to the forward area. However, no formal policy file for this Element has been established.

RECOMMENDED: A file of the Element Commander's policies be established and maintained.

b. The requirement for maintaining historical records is being met by including a Historical Technician, AFSC 72271, with the personnel accompanying the Element. This space is not provided in T/D PW-1, 1 March 1952.

c. No board action or courts-martials are pending on any personnel currently alerted for this Element.

d. No Records Administration Program has been established for this Element.

<u>RECOMMENDED:</u> Appointment of a Records Officer for the Weather Reconnaissance Element and compliance with AFM 181-5.

e, Enlistments of 21 airmen are due to expire during the months of January, February, and March 1953. No action has been taken by the Commanding Officer, 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron to request extension of these enlistments as authorized by paragraph 9,p, Movement Orders, Weather, 7 July 1952, issued by Hq MATS.

2. Organization Records.

a. Organization records of the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron are currently maintained on an acceptable basis and, as a result, no difficulties should be encountered by the Element in initiating and maintaining required records.

b. A conflict in instructions regarding submission of the Morning Report appears to exist between paragraph 3c(17) Forward to AFM 171-6 and paragraph 4b(1), Appendix 3 to Annex C, Task Group 132.4 Operations Plan 1-52. The latter reference says in part: "Units will forward (the Morning Report) daily with copy to arrive Statistical Service Division, Hq Task Group 132.4 - - - " (Underlining supplied).

3. Individual Records.

a. Paragraph 9d, Movement Orders, Weather, 7 July 1952, issued by Hq MATS, states that individual records will accompany each individual. The Commanding Officer, 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron states that it is not planned to forward individual records except for Forms 8-117, and for flying personnel, the Medical and Dental Treatment Records and Individual Flight Records of the Field Personnel Records Group. It is the Squadron Commander's intent to maintain individual records at Hickam AFB.

> <u>RECOMMENDED:</u> The Squadron Commander, 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron, indicate his reasons for maintaining all individual records at Hickam and his recommendations in this regard.

b. Personal Affairs Statements, AF Forms 381, have been initiated for all personnel and are nearly complete, but need screening to assure all possible items have been entered.

c. It is planned to pay personnel of the Weather Element by dispatching a Class A Agent to Hickam where pay records will be maintained, and return with funds to Kwajalein. In this connection, attention is invited to paragraph 90102c(1)(a) AFM 173-10.


4. Medical.

a. Some personnel projected for movement with the Weather Element do not have current the immunizations required by Movement Orders Weather, 7 July 1952, Hq MATS, and Task Group 132.4, Operations Plan 1-52.

b. At the time of this inspection, 9 officers projected for duty with the Weather Element will require annual physicals prior to

c. Records of the Hickam AFB Dental Surgeon indicate the following for personnel projected for duty with the Weather Element:

It is apparent that classification procedures for up-grading have not followed required demonstration of skills. Paragraph 6a, Annex A to this report, lists the recorded PAFSC's of personnel alerted for this movement with considerable deficiencies in qualification. noted. However, paragraph 2, Annex B, reports that the majority of crew personnel are technically qualified. For example, 35 pilots assigned to the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron are all technically qualified; records, on the other hand, of personnel selected for the Weather Element indicate 14 out of 20 are not at the fully qualified level of Pilot, Reconnaissance (B-29) AFSC 1324C. This apparent discrepancy exists in practically every field. Further, paragraph 1, Annex B, reports an effective OJT program.

> <u>RECOMMENDED</u>: A review of the qualifications of all personnel projected for this movement who do not possess the AFSC of their duty assignment, and where personnel are found qualified, the necessary classification action be accomplished in accordance with AFR 35-392.

c. Captain Marion H. Atkinson, PAFSC 1324C, has been selected to fill the T/D position as Adjutant (7024); however, his Qualification Record (ND AGO Form 66) does not indicate that he is qualified to fill this key position. Captain Atkinson has not been awarded an administrative AFSC and has only had a short assignment as such as an additional duty.

7. Security. At the time of this inspection all personnal assigned to the Task Element, with the exception of A/1C Wiley L. Snedecker, had either National Agency Checks or were processed for them in accordance with instructions contained in Operations Flam 1-52. However, proper entries were not made in all instances in Officers' and Airmen's records. Sixteen AEC Clearances have been initiated on key personnel of the Weather Element; this number is considered sufficient to meet all requirements.

> <u>RECOMMENDED</u>: Security Clearance be obtained for the above-named individual and proper entries be entered in official records in accordance with AFR 205-6.







Personnel & Administration Annex A-1

1. All references to paragraph mumbers pertain to ANNEX A of basic report.

2. <u>Reference paragraph la</u>: An "Element Commander's Policy File" was established on 15 August 1952 and will be maintained for the duration of the existance of the Weather Reconnaissance Element's activities.

3. <u>Reference paragraph 1b</u>: The Historical Technician AFSC 72271 will occupy a troop space in TD PW-1 allocated to one (1) Senior Clerk AFSC 70250 for the Intelligence Section. Inasmuch as no change in total authorizations resulted from this substitution, TD change was not requested.

4. Reference paragraph 1c: Noted. No corrective action required.

5. <u>Reference paragraph ld:</u> At the present time, the Weather Reconnaissence Element, Provisional (132.4.3.1) was not organized as an active unit. As a result, all records pertaining to activities of the Provisional Element are records of the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron, Medium, Weather. Such records are being processed and controlled under the parent unit's Records Administration Program. The unit will be placed in an active status, with personnel attached, concurrently with the departure of the advance echelon for Kwajalein, M.I. At the time that the Weather Reconnaissance element becomes an active unit, a separate Records Program will be established under the supervision of a properly appointed Decords Officer.

6. <u>Reference paragraph le</u>: Planning data provided in Task Group 132.4 Operations Plan 1-52, dated 27 June 1952 indicates that all Provisional Element personnel will have completed their project activities on or about the end of November. Inasuch as personnel whose enlistments expire in January, February and March 1953, will have returned to Hickam Air Force Base, T.H. prior to expiration of enlistments and in sufficient time to permit processing prior to discharge, extensions of enlistments are not considered necessary.

7. Reference paragraph 2a: Noted. No corrective action required.

8. <u>Reference paragraph 2b:</u> The discrepancy between the provisions of AFM 171-6 and Annex C, Task Group 132.4 Operations Plan 1-52 has been noted. - Corrective action is not appropriate at this level. As a result of the Task Group directive, this organization has provided for a Morning Report clerk within the Weather Reconnaissance Element personnel resources.

9. <u>Reference peragraph 3a</u>: It is the intention of the indorsing officer that all records, except those indicated in paragraph 3a, be retained by the parent unit at Hickem Air Force Rase for reasons shown below. Paragraph 9, Movement Order, is not interpreted as applicable to this unit, since personnel are already assigned PCS overseas,

. . . ·

a. Officers' records must be retained at the unit of assignment during periods of TDY under the provisions of paragraph 6d(4)a, AFR 35-68 as amended by AFR 35-68B, dated 5 June 1952.

b. Enlisted hersonnel records may be retained by the unit of assignment during periods of temporary duty at the discretion of the unit commander under the provisions of paragraph 6d(4)b, AFR 35-68, dated 11 December 1951.

c. It is the opinion of the indorsing officer, that the retention of personnel records at the unit of assignment is in the best interests of the service. The Weather Reconnaissance Element must provide its own administrative overhead at the operating location. The transfer of records would necessitate an increase in manning for clerical personnel and personnel specialists at additional cost to the roverment. All basic personnel reports, official morning report entries, forecast rosters, promotions, effectiveness reports (accept in selected cases) and similiar actions must be prepared or accomplished by the unit of assignment. The aveilability of personnel records at the parent unit headquarters will provide all the nocessary information thus required and will insure proper continuity of "records maintenance."

10. <u>Reference paragraph 3b</u>: Screening of Personal Affairs Statements, AF Forms 381, by personal interview with individuals concerned, was begun on 15 August 1952. It is enticipated that screening will be completed prior to 15 September 1952.

11. <u>Reference paragraph 3c</u>: The contents of paragraph 90102c(1)(a), AFM 173-10 have been noted. It is not anticipated that any difficulty will be encountared by the Class A Agent in closing accounts within 24 hours after completion of payments. The Class A Agent will be an officer stationed at Hickam who will proceed to and from Kwajalein by unit or MATS aircraft...

12. <u>Reference paragraph 4a</u>: Requirements for immunizations have been previously coordinated locally with the 1500th Medical Group. Immunization records are currently being screened, and personnel will be scheduled to receive required immunizations beginning on or about 20 August 1952.

13. <u>Reference péresraph 40</u>: Noted. This item will require only monitoring oction pending completion of physical examinations.

14. Reference paragraph 4c: Coordination with the Hickam Air Force Base dental surgeon on the matter of dental work has been completed and personnel were scheduled for dental appointments beginning 15 Lugust 1952.

15. Reference paragraph 4d: Noted. Appropriate action is indicated in paragraphs 11, 12 and 13, above. 2.

16. <u>Reference paragraphs 5a and 5b</u>: The allocation of 54 officers and 2 warrant officers against an authorization of 56 officers is considered appropriate and no officer vacancies are considered to exist. The allocation of only 245 airmen against an authorization of 253 airmen is based on the need for reduction of the number of personnel to be placed at Kwajalein. The requirement for reducing manning to Absolute minimums was stated in a letter from the Commander, Task Group 132.4, file AGC 300, dated 26 May 1952, subject: Management, in which it was directed that "organizational structures be reviewed and that personnel requirements be again analyzed with a view towards reducing present authorized strength without impairing the capability of this command to perform its ultimate mission." A reduction of eight (8) airmen was effected in consonance with the cited directive. The majority of the reduction was effected through elimination of administrative overhead. A ninth space is actually a manning shortage of and air crew member, an Airborne Weather Equipment Operator, AFSC 25172. Necessary action has been taken to fill this vacancy from within 57th resources and no problem is considered to exist in this respect.

17. <u>Reference caragraph 6a</u>:

a. Initially it must be noted that TD PW-1 is excessively idealistic in that only two (2) "10" level and two (2) "30" level personnel are authorized out of a total airmen authorization of two hundred fifty three (253). Manning of the reconnaissance element is to be accomplished completely from within the resources of the 57th Strateg Beconnaissance Squadres and the parent unit is committed to maintain a weather reconnaissance mission capability at Hickam during the period of the project. Thus, the selection of personnel necessitated an equitable division of skills between Hickan and Kwajalein in order that both segments of the organization might function satisfactorily. Reference is made to paragraph 1d, Annex D, in which it is indicated that the maintenance section of this unit has a capability exceedin current two hour utilization commitments. Paragraphs 1 and 5, Annex B, have indicated that satisfactory OJT and normal training programs are in effect, and paragraph 2 of innex B, indicates that sufficient aircrews were found technically qualified to fill the requirements of TD P-1. Thus the assignment of appropriate skills to the Weather Reconnaissance Element scens to be a metter of record. The apparent discrepancies in hanning as indicate by the tabulations in Annex A are based primarily on the fact that FAFSC was used as the sole basis for establishing manning sufficiency. A re-tabulation has been commiled showing the authorized spaces against the AFSCs

(either primary or additional as appropriate) of the officers and airmen selected to fill the authorized spaces. As will be noted, a considerably different picture results from the re-tabulated presentation.

b. Replacement airmen were not received in any numbers by this organization until the first quarter of 1952. Those airmen arriving during that period were, in the main, newly graduated from from Air Training Command Schools. For this reason, a relatively large number of "30" level airmen are indicated, many of whom are currently eligible for up-grading classification action. Approximately fifty-five (55) up-grading classification actions are currently being processed by this unit. These actions back-logged as a result of 2143rd Air Weather Wing Messageform.00657, dated 18 July 1952, which froze upgrading in the "43", "64" and "70" career fields." Release of the "freeze" on upgrading was effected by 2143rd Air Weather Wing message DP UG 013, dated 4 August 1952, which was received by this unit on 13 August 1952. The completion of these classification actions will result in a more accurate picture of available skills.


18. <u>Reference paragraph 66</u>: Noted, All crew positions are considered appropriately filled, except in the instance of one Dropsonde Operator, AFSC 25152. Action will be completed upon the procurement of a replacement for this vacancy, which will be accomplished before 15 September 1952 from within resources of the 57th Strategic Reconnaiseance Squadrom.

19. <u>Reference paragraph 6c</u>: The qualification of the referenced officer with respect to the duties of an Adjutant and Personnel Officer have been well established over a period of two years with this organization and for a period of 2 years as an active administrative officer in the Mational Guard. Award of an SSN 2110 or 2200 during the period when the SSN system was in effect was prohibted by regulation inasmuch as the officer was assigned against a TO vacancy of Filot, Reconnaissance, SSN 1062 administrative duties were performed in an "additional duty" capacity. Lack of award of an appropriate administrative AFSC was a matter of personal choice of the officer concerned rather than of deficiency in skill, and is based on a desire to remain primarily active in operational occupational areas. Inasmuch as there is not a shortage of administratively qualified officers in the United States Air Force and the accomplishment of administrative duties by the cited officer has been voluntarily, in addition to his primary flying duties, the desires of the officer were considered primary in considering the appropriate AFSC awards at the time of conversion and classification to the AFSC system.

20. <u>Reference variation 7</u>: An NAC request was submitted for the referenced similar, by this organization, on 1 February 1951. Tracer action was submitted to Headquarters, Air Weather Service on 7 July 1952. Response from Headquarters, Air Weather Service, dated 29 July 1952, and received on 5 August 1952, indicated no record of the NAC request was available in that headquarters. A second NAC request is currently being accomplished and will be submitted prior to 19 August 1952.

Training Annex

1. <u>On-The-Job Training</u>. The CJT program that has been established in all sections of the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron more than complies with existing MATS, PACD and 2143 Air Weather Wing directives. Each section maintains a rigid, accurate records system. The training curriculum for each AFSC is well outlined, strongly stressed, and properly administered by trained instructor personnel. Periodic written tests are conducted to measure individual's progress and ability before consideration is given for upgrading. The CJT program was adjudged as very satisfactory.

2. Aircrews. At the time of this inspection, sufficient crew members were found to be technically qualified in their duties to fulfill the requirements of T/D PN-1, dated 1 March 1952. The following is a tabulation of aircrew members of the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron:

3. <u>Simulated Combat Training</u>. The majority of personnel to be attached to the weather Element for duty participated in 1951 on Joint Task Force 3, "Operation GREENHOUSE". Daily operations are almost identical to operations which would be conducted under combat conditions, with the exception that no armament is carried aboard WB-29 aircraft. All aircraft commanders are well briefed in CIRVIS reporting procedure as outlined in USAF extracts from JANAP 146 (A) as amended and also FLYCERPT as outlined in AF Letter 200-5.

4. Training Facilities and Equipment. No inadequacies in assigned training facilities and aids were noted with the exception of radiological training equipment. Radiac equipment is not available to the squadron for training purposes even through this organization is continually involved in various atomic projects involving radiation. In the past, equipment utilized during special projects has not been retained by the Squadron. Consideration should be given for procuring radiological test and training equipment for use by the Squadron to maintain training at a high level.


5. <u>Training Program</u>. A continuous training program is in effect and meets all requirements of AF, MATS, and Air Weather Service regulations. At the time of this inspection, the Squadron was well underway in meeting the training subjects required of all units of Task Group 132.4 concerning safety from radiological hazards and meeting the minimum training requirements for personnel who will participate in specific radiological operations. Approximately 50% of this training has been completed and the Squadron Commander indicates that all training will be completed prior to moving into the forward area.



1; All references to paragraph numbers pertain to ANNEX B, of basic report.

2. Reference paragraph 1: Noted, No corrective action required.

3. <u>Reference paragraph 2</u>: Noted. Although sufficient crew members are qualified to fulfill project requirements, a continuing training program is in effect to qualify all personnel holding air crew AFSC's.

4. Reference paragraph 3: Noted. No corrective action required.

5. Reference paragraph 4: The non-availability of radiological safety equipment for training purposes is not considered an acute problem during the training period for Operation IVY (Secret) although the ready accessibility of such equipment during this period would have been desirgble. This statement is based on the fact that a large percentage of assigned personnel have undergone previous training and operations for Project GREENHOUSE, during which radiological safety gear was utilized. Due to the probability that the unit will participate in future operations, however, the headquarters highly concurs with the recommendations in paragraph 4 of Annex B. Separate UPREAL Change Request (AF Form 25a) will be submitted at such time as the unit's UPREAL (under TO 1724P) is received through command channels.

6. <u>Reference paragraph 5</u>: As of 15 August 1952, approximately 90% of all required training was completed. Remainder of training is expected to be completed prior to the end of August 1952.

1. Organizational Equipment.

a. This organization is at present operating with equipment authorized by T/OLE 1-172LT in accordance with the last reorganization directive, G.O. No. 21, Eq WATS, dated 1 February 1951.

b. Equipment presently on hand is approximately 95% of total authorized.

c. Plans formulated by the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron for the movement of Reconnaissance Element, Provisional (132.4.3.1) requires only that equipment and tools issued to Individuals and certain special propeller tools and selected radar and radio maintenance mock-ups to accompany the unit. These requirements were established on the basis that all equipment included in Tab K of Secret Study, dated 29 February 1952, subject: (Uncl) Support and Operational Requirements of Task Unit 132.4.3.1 (Provisional), dated 27 February 1952, would be provided at Kwajalein. Concurrence by Hq Task Group 132.1 was assumed in that, letter, Hq Task Group 132.4, File AF 400.312, dated 6 May 1952, was received by the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron which contained brownline listings, including all equipment and supplies, except 278 line items, submitted as requirements by the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron. These brownline listings were submitted as Task Group requisitions numbers 7152751, 7152752, 7152753, 7152754 and 7152858 to SMAMA for Flee-P-SFU-132.4.3.1. Items that did not appear in the brownline listings were extracted to AF-2272-SO, Eniwetck, for shipment to Kwajalein. A monthly report is received by the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron from Task Group 132.4 giving the status of supplies shipped. To date, records indicate that 91% of all SLAMA requisitions have been shipped and approximately 85% have been received and checked in at Kwajalein supply, with additional items received but not processed. Only two of the items had been received from Eniwetok; the remainder were scheduled for shipment during the first week of August.

2. Clothing and Individual Equipment.

a. Clothing and individual equipment is complete and serviceable as was determined by showdown inspection.

b. For the movement of Reconnaissance Element, Provisional (132.4.3.1); only summer type clothing is being required to accompany the individuals, woolen clothing to be stored at Hickam by the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron.

3. Aircraft Equipment.

a. Aircraft are properly equipped to perform the assigned mission. The AF Forms 263 are maintained for each assigned aircraft and indicate location of all installed equipment.

b. Special equipment required to accomplish classified mission of the Reconnaissance Element 132.4.3.1 Type B-31, is on hand; all "A" components are not complete but action has been taken to procure shortages. Installation of the "A" components is necessary on three aircraft. No firm date has been established for completion as the aircraft to be equipped have not been definitely decided. Considerable difficulty has been experienced in the past in the installation of special equipment due to the fact that all parts necessary have not been included in the kits. The items short, although standard items, have been difficult to obtain. Every effort should be made by the suplying agency of special equipment to include in the kits all components necessary for installation.

4. Air Supplies,

a. During the time of this inspection two WB-29 aircraft were carried ACCP. Parts ACCP were screw assy flap mechanism, stock no. 0105-8-2064 and nose window, stock no. 0108-6696. Both ACCP's were dated 1 August 1952. A check of Base Supply indicated that stock levels on these items had been established and appeared to be adequate from past consumption. Increased requirements were anticipated due to the length of time of installation and more rigid inspections being performed due to age. Due-ins indicate that sufficient items are on requisition but receipt of the items have not been sufficient to avert ACCP's.

b. An agreement was made between Commanding Officer, 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron, Base Supply Officer, AF-714-SO, and Task Group Commander which involves the supplying of built-up engines for the Reconnaissance Element Provisional from Hickam and relieves the Task Force 132 of some logistical support required by paragraph 2b, Movement Orders, Hq Air Weather Service, AWS DPL 370.5, dated 7 July 1952. Plans formulated by the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron calls for four built-up engines to accompany the Reconnaissance Element on the movement and replacements made as reparable engines are returned to Hickam by unit support aircraft. An estimated 14 engines will be required during this project.

5. Packing Marking.

a. The plans for movement of the Reconnaissance Element, Provisional (132.4.3.1) calls for movement to be accomplished in organic aircraft, with the understanding that support aircraft would be assigned for the duration of the special mission.

b. Items of equipment such as radio and radar maintenance mock-ups, special propeller tools and files of technical publications are maintained in cases incorporating covers that can be closed and readily become shipping cases. Tool kits are to be handcarried by the individuals to whom the tools are issued.

c. Markings used are only those needed to indicate the organization and not the shipment number.

6. Lovement.



a. Plans formulated by the 57th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron for the movement and support of the Reconnaissance Element, Provisional (132.4.3.1) will be affected by organic aircraft based on assignment of two YC-97 type aircraft. To date, these support aircraft have not been assigned.
