Dear Mr. Chairman:

This is in response to your October 23, 1984, letter requesting further documentation concerning radiation experiments performed on human subjects.

The enclosed package of material supplies the requested documentation. The first enclosure answers the specific questions in your letter and includes some documentation that is not among the fact sheets. This is followed by fact sheets with their corresponding documentation, grouped by the topics indicated on the summary fact sheets. Four reports referenced in the fact sheets are classified and have not been included. Copies of these classified reports could be secured and made available for review by the subcommittee members who have a clearance.

The information on the names and other personal information on the prisoners (SFS2.001 and 2.002) has been requested, but has not yet been received. The information contained in the material to be supplied may be exempt from public disclosure pursuant to Exemptions 5 and 6 of the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. §§ 552(b) (5) and (6). Exemption 5 protects memoranda or letters that contain advice, opinions, or recommendations which are pre-decisional and a part of the decision-making process of the agency. Exemption 6 protects information in personnel, medical, and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. In fact, two of the individuals signed forms consenting to publication of results of the research project (SFS2.001 and 2.002) with the understanding that they would not be personally identified. We seek your guidance on how best to respect their decision in responding to the Subcommittee's request.

With respect to question 1.a regarding the destruction of medical records, legal records and other documents relating to radiological exposure of test subjects, employees, military veterans, "downwinders," and residents of islands which received fallout from atmospheric bomb tests in the Pacific, it is the Department's policy, to the maximum extent possible, to provide information to the public on the Department's atomic weapons activities.

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
