Thanks for your letter of March 18. We can certainly supply
 one secondary polycythemia blood although the number of
 patients with congenital heart disease with a saturation in
 the 70 to 80% range are few. We have tentatively scheduled
 a child with a transposition whose peripheral saturation
 we don't know but who is obviously cyanotic. You can cer-
 tainly have blood at any time at your convenience, but prob-
 ably the easiest way would be to obtain it at time of cardiac
 catheterization when we have needles and catheters in the
 blood vessels. If this would be satisfactory, someone from
 your department could simply call my office on any afternoon
 except Wednesday and let me know what arrangements would be
 best for you for getting the blood.

It was a pleasure to see you at the recent symposium, and I
 am very glad that you enjoyed it. The work of Dr. Liebow's
 is certainly astounding, and I've always classified Dr.
 Richards as one of the Greats.
